HOUSE & HOME OF THE MONTH





A FRESH TAKE ON COASTAL CHIC SHOWCASES COOL HUES AND RICH PATINAS.

In the sitting room, designers Tommy Smythe and Lindsay Mens Craig took inspiration from the home's seaside location in Connecticut with textural elements such as an antique steamer trunk turned coffee table and soft furnishings in varying patterns and shades of blue and white. Star **pendant**, Residential Lighting Studio, **bench**, Christie Antique & Vintage Show; **bench upholstery fabric**, Bilbrough & Co; **sofas**, Sarah Richardson Design; **white table lamp** (background), Primavera. **OPPOSITE:** "The first time we walked the property with the homeowner, we fell in love with this house," says Tommy (*pictured with Lindsay Mens Craig*). He was immediately taken by the century-old home's white clapboard exterior. 



STEPS FROM LONG ISLAND SOUND and boasting views of the water, this century-old Colonial Revival home in Connecticut has a charmingly maritime feel. When its longtime owners decided to update the interior three years ago, they turned to Tommy Smythe and Lindsay Mens Craig of Sarah Richardson Design, whose work they had admired in the pages of *H&H*. The result is a refreshing take on classic coastal style.

Q&A

HOUSE & HOME: How did you approach this design?

TOMMY SMYTHE: When we start any project, one of the first things we do is look out the window to see what we see. It may seem counterintuitive to *interior* design but, in every case, the view at least partially informs the colour palette.

H&H: How did that translate in this case?

TS: The home has a really special location. It's about 15 metres from the breakwall, and it's so close to the water that, when you're in the upstairs rooms, you almost feel like you're on a boat. There's an incredible view of the ocean and the skies that changes with the storms and the sunsets. All the colours we used in the house were derived from the sand, the sky, the grass and the sea.

H&H: What else helped to convey a sense of place?

LINDSAY MENS CRAIG: The finishes we picked. The fabrics we used are cotton or linen, so they feel relaxed. The wood finishes aren't high-gloss, and the antiques have a story behind them but don't feel too precious. TS: Sarah Richardson always says that if you can't be in a waterfront house in bare feet and

Combining an eclectic array of classic furniture styles such as a gilded Rococo-style chair and tailored sofas delivers a refined yet easygoing feel. 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"We were mindful of not over-renovating the house," says Tommy of the decision to turn one small window above the kitchen sink into two larger ones, which opened up the wall space they needed to place the appliances in more logical positions. "Little things like that made big impacts." *Stools, TK Collections; wall tile, Saltillo Imports; cabinetry, Hanford Cabinet & Woodworking; cabinetry hardware, The Door Store; roman blind fabric, Primavera; pendants, Vaughan Designs.* **OPPOSITE, TOP RIGHT:** New warm wood floors, a worn antique runner and brass hardware in the kitchen offset the coolness of the white cabinetry and grey countertops. A variety of similar-but-different lantern-style light fixtures helps demarcate each zone. *Custom vent hood, Beaver Creek Metal; runner, J&D Oriental* Rugs Co.; *flush-mount light fixtures, Visual Comfort.*

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wet bathing suits, you haven't done your job as a designer! This project was all about practical living and comfort without sacrificing refinement. You can put your feet up on the sofas because they're covered in white denim. The house has an air of sophistication, but it feels casual at the same time.

H&H: Did you consciously focus on nautical style? LMC: We wanted to suggest nautical style without overdoing it so, instead of sailing motifs and seagulls, we chose things like the wallpaper for the entrance hall. It's evocative of stormy skies at sea, but it's not thematic.

H&H: Do you have a favourite moment in the house? TS: The entrance is mine. The mix of antiques and the dramatic wallpaper immediately establish a connection to the area. You know when you walk through the door that you're in New England.

H&H: How did the homeowners react?

LMC: They were really pleased! I think their reaction was partly due to their desire to be surprised a little bit. That was fun for us, too.

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An antique carved wooden shell above the fireplace mantel in the den is a standout piece in a home full of one-of-a-kind finds. "It doesn't just speak to the oceanside location but also to craftsmanship, age, soul and that kind of new nautical flavour," says Tommy. **Drapery and roman blind fabric,** Y&Co.; **grasscloth wallpaper** by Schumacher, Bilbrough & Co.; **trim colour,** Charcoal Slate (HC-178), Benjamin Moore.

RAINBOW. In addition to classic blues and seafoams, a wide range of colours including pastel pink, slate grey and seagrass green can look just as coastal. 2 BE BRASSY. Warm metals such as brass and bronze help balance cool greys and blues while adding a subtle maritime feel. 3 GO MATTE. Glossy finishes can sometimes be at odds with a relaxed, seaside vibe. Instead, opt for weathered antiques, soft linen upholstery and patinated finishes.

A judicious use of

A judicious use of stripes in wallpaper and upholstery can add whimsy to a room while evoking the classic sailor's tunic. 5 COMFORT IS KEY. Deep sofas and chairs, plenty of small tables and blankets to pull over your legs on cool evenings are important elements.
